A Simple, Daily Action Plan to Build Real Momentum

The biggest reason beginners fail at traffic is because it can be overwhelming, slow to start and hard to stay on track.

That's why I created this course. It shows you exactly what to do, why you're doing it, where to do it and, most importantly, a day to day outline of what to do!

Here is your simple to follow 30 day traffic challenge.

Each day gives you:

- **One simple action**

- **One optional bonus** (for extra momentum)
- **One confidence reminder** (because beginners need encouragement)

You will build traffic using **the Marie Grove Method Flowwheel**, in small, doable steps.

Let's begin.

WEEK 1 — Foundation (Days 1–7)

Goal: Get set up, learn your platforms, publish your first content.

DAY 1 — Choose Your Core Platform

Pick ONE to start with:

- Medium
- Blogger
- Pinterest

Action: Decide which platform you'll publish your pillar content on.

Bonus: Create your account if you don't have one yet.

Confidence Reminder: You don't need everything built today. One platform is enough.

DAY 2 — Choose Your Beginner Topic

Select a topic your audience cares about and you can write simply about.

Pro Tip: Using AI to create your outline is smart business. As long as you use it for *an outline only* and add your personal experience, opinions and voice you'll be fine.

DO NOT just copy and paste what the AI gives you word for word!

Why? Because if you do that, you won't stand out online. Since many others will be just copying and pasting AI results, your content will just be more generic noise.

Instead, use AI to create the outline, then go back through that and add in **you** - your insights, experience, humor, humanity.

That creates the best of both worlds: AI massively speeds up creating content **BUT** you don't lose your unique voice and perspective!

DAY 4 — Write Your First Pillar Content

Aim for something that really helps people in your niche. Solve a common problem, help them choose the best option for a tool, or whatever works for your niche. Don't worry about being perfect.

Action: Write 300–700 words using your outline.

Bonus: Add formatting (headers, short paragraphs).

Confidence Reminder: Publishable is better than perfect.

Pro Tip: Another common use for AI: once AI creates your outline and you've gone through that outline and added your voice, you can copy and paste your version of the article into AI and ask for spellcheck or grammar recommendations. This may make you more comfortable before publishing.

DAY 5 — Publish Your Content

Time to go live. This moves the entire system forward.

Action: Publish your pillar piece on Medium or Blogger.

Bonus: Add an internal link to one related post (once you have a few published)

Confidence Reminder: Most people never publish. You just did.

Pro Tip: Even though both Blogger and Medium are platforms that cater to articles, don't forget the images. Adding an eye catching main image on your Medium article is a must do before publishing (it's optional on Blogger).

It's also good to add images throughout your content, 2-3 depending on the length of your article. Make sure your images are congruent with the topic of the article.

DO NOT overthink this. Go to [Canva.com](https://www.canva.com) and pick out a template for a blog post image. Then just delete the image in that template and replace it with one that is more in line with your article's topic. Download the finished image to your computer, upload it to your platform - either Medium or Blogger.

DAY 6 — Create 2–3 Pinterest Pins

Use text-only or simple image backgrounds. Again, you can use [Canva.com](https://www.canva.com) for free. Just login and search for Pinterest pin templates. Find one you like, remove the existing image and replace it with one that fits your topic.

Action: Make 2–3 pins using headlines from your content.

Bonus: Make 1 alternate-color version.

Confidence Reminder: Pinterest isn't just about aesthetics, it's about creating pins that answer questions and offer solutions .

DAY 7 — Publish Your Pins

Time to open your traffic pathways.

Action: Publish your 2–3 pins with keywords and descriptions, AI can help create these for you, or use the templates above.

Bonus: Add one more pin if you have energy.

Confidence Reminder: Organic traffic starts small. You're building momentum. Stay consistent, if you do, you'll be way ahead of 99+% of other people. ***And that's why you'll win when others fail.***

★ WEEK 2 — Visibility (Days 8–14)

Goal: Increase reach, build consistency, and begin the Flowwheel.

DAY 8 — Create 2 More Pins

Fuel the algorithm.

Medium ↔ Blogger flow.

Every beginner runs into bumps along the way — it's normal, expected, and part of learning. What matters is how you respond.

Let's troubleshoot.

★ 1. If You're Getting Impressions but No Clicks

This means Pinterest is *showing* your pin... but people aren't choosing it.

Here's what to do:

✓ Fix Your Text Overlay

Make sure it's:

- bold
- readable

- clear about the benefit

Example tweaks:

“Beginner-Friendly Steps to Get Started”

✓ **Reduce the Words**

Crowded pins get ignored.

Keep it to 4–10 words max.

Half your audience prefers one or the other.

Small changes create big improvements.

★ 2. If You’re Getting Clicks but No Saves

This is a design + relevance issue.

Fix it by:

✓ **Improving the clarity of your message**

People save content that feels practical and helpful.

✓ **Using numbers or steps**

“Simplify Your Workflow in 3 Steps”

“SIMPLE habits that help beginners grow”

✓ **Creating softer colors or clean layouts**

Saves tend to increase with gentle, minimal designs.

✓ Adding specificity

“Beginner Traffic Tips”

→ “Beginner-Friendly Ways to Get More Visitors”

★ 3. If Your Pins Aren't Getting Impressions

This means Pinterest doesn't understand your keywords yet.

✓ Add Fresh Keywords to Your Pin Descriptions

Use universal keyword stems like:

- beginner tips
- simple steps
- how to start
- quick-start guide

✓ Add a Second Pin With a Clearer Topic

Pinterest often prefers one design over another.

✓ Make Sure Your Board Matches Your Topic

Boards help Pinterest categorize your pins.

✓ Publish 2–3 more pins over the next few days

Sometimes Pinterest just needs more samples.

★ 4. If Your Articles Aren't Getting Views (Medium/Blogger)

This is almost always a keyword or clarity issue.

✓ Tighten your headline

Use:

“How to...”

“Simple ways to...”

“A beginner-friendly guide to...”

✓ Add a clear introduction

Readers decide in seconds whether to stay.

✓ Improve scannability

- shorter paragraphs
- headers
- bold key phrases

✓ Publish consistently for 2–3 weeks

Medium especially rewards steady publishing.

✓ Repurpose the content with a new headline

You can rewrite the same piece for a new angle.

Traffic grows because content *accumulates* over time.

★ 5. If Your Paid Boost Is Slow

Totally normal — small budgets move slowly.

Try this:

✓ **Let it run at least 3 days**

Turning it off too soon resets the learning.

✓ **Check your keywords**

Remove overly broad ones like “business,” “work,” or “money.”

✓ **Boost a different pin**

Sometimes a new design performs better.

✓ **Add a high-contrast version**

Bold pins often get cheaper clicks.

✓ **Keep the budget small and steady**

\$3–\$5/day is perfect for beginners.

Paid traffic is about **learning**, not perfection.

6. If You Feel Discouraged

This is the most common challenge — and the most solvable.

Here’s what to remember:

✓ **Traffic builds like a snowball**

Slow → steady → suddenly bigger.

✓ **You are building assets**

Every pin, post, or article adds to your long-term traffic.

✓ **Beginners grow through *consistency*, not expertise**

You do not need to be perfect to get result

✓ You are ahead of everyone still “thinking about it”

Action builds confidence.

✓ You only need ONE piece of content to take off

One pin.

One post.

One article.

That’s all it takes to change your momentum.

★ 7. The #1 Beginner Mistake (And How to Avoid It)

The biggest mistake beginners make is:

✗ Giving up too early.

Traffic *always* starts slow, for everyone. Those gurus or TikTok influencers didn’t start out with tons of traffic and followers. It took them time to build. ***It will take you time too.***

Please, don’t make my mistake and not give your business time to grow. Use this system, give it time to become profitable and then scale it as big as you want.

Platforms need:

- content
- consistency
- signals
- time

The people who succeed aren't the smartest or the most talented — they are the ones who stayed long enough for the system to work.

For success, your job isn't to be perfect, it's to learn, adapt and keep taking action.
